DOB: April 5, 2019

Eastern black rhinos are native to Eastern Africa: Republic of South Africa, Namibia, Kenya, Zimbabwe, Tanzania, Zambia, Malawi, Swaziland and Botswana.

They have poor eyesight but incredible hearing. While not aggressive these animals will charge if they feel threatened and can reach speeds up to 35 mph.

Ayana gave birth to Tumani and Kamara right here at the Blank Park Zoo. Their births are very important for the rhino population as a whole.

The Black Mambas Anti-Poaching Unit

is the world's first all-female anti-poaching unit. They are 36 young African women who patrol almost 50,000 acres of the Balule Nature Reserve, part of the Greater Kruger National Park, South Africa. Kruger is home to the largest population of rhino in the world and also is victim to more poaching attacks than any other area.



They protect the animal populations while elevating the surrounding communities. The Black Mambas Bush Babies program is based in schools in communities surrounding the areas where the Black Mambas patrol and works with children between the ages of 7 and 17. Over 2000 children across ten schools have been taught about the different behaviors of wildlife, how to protect them and have been given an introduction to ecology and conservation.

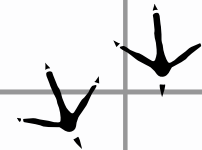

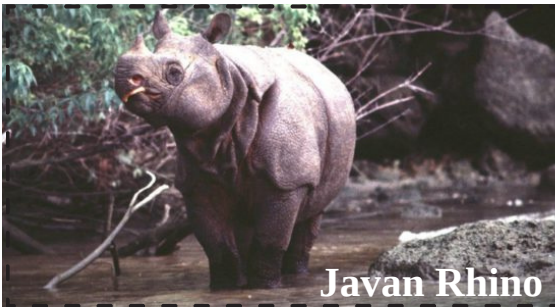

Black Rhino

Black rhinos are browsers. Their prehensile lip is adapted for grasping and holding leaves and branches of shrubs and trees.

Javan Rhino

Javan rhinos are solitary in nature and are rarely ever seen. Females have very small horns, and sometime no horn at all!

White Rhino

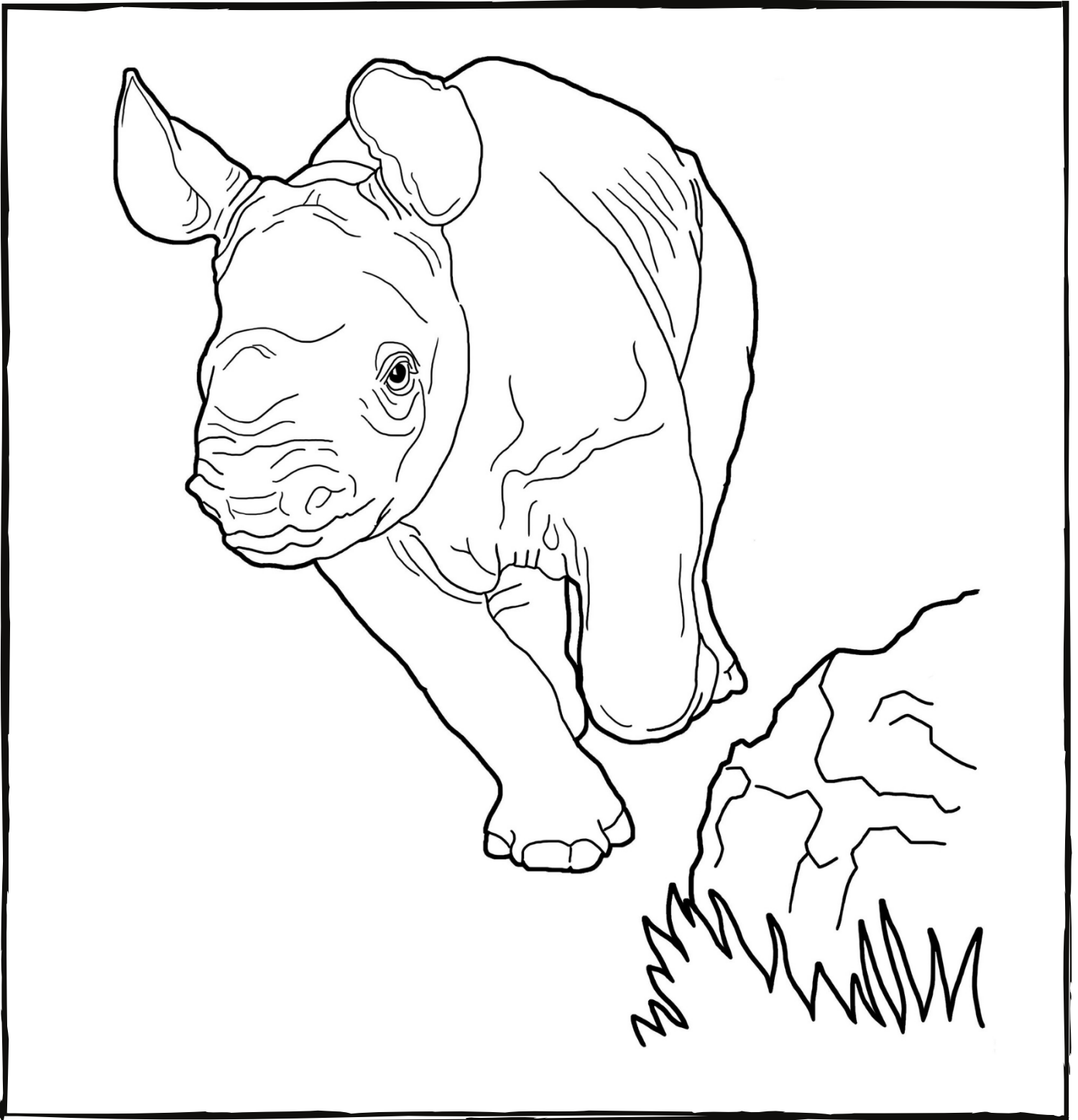
White rhinos are grazers. Their wide, square upper lip is adapted for feeding on grasses.

Greater One-Horned Rhino

Found in northern India and southern Nepal. When not grazing on land, they like to immerse themselves in water, where they also graze on aquatic plants.

Sumatran Rhino

The only two-horned rhino in Asia. There are fewer than 100 of these rhinos left in the wild.
